

You could arrange them alone on the ground or stacked like a pyramid to draw gazes upwards.

Whichever display you decide on, there are some key aspects to consider when starting a container garden. Firstly, the containers you use should have holes at the bottom to enable the soil to drain freely so that the plant roots have an adequate air supply. You'll also need to use potting soil rather than the soil in your ground-based garden. Potting soil is well aerated, sterile and lightweight. Moreover, it has the proper balance of organic material and mineral particles to sustain your plant life. Finally, there is no need to fill an entire container with soil; the amount you should use will depend upon the types of plants that it will house. A trick to use less soil, and help the environment, is to put empty plastic bottles in the bottom thirds of each container. This will also enable the containers to be lighter and easier to move.

Plant containers can result in the perfect addition to your garden, acting as conversation starters and pieces to admire as you relax and soak up the Florida sun. The benefits of creating your own plant containers range from fun to educational since doing so is a great opportunity


